Fun in the Sun for special needs children



He was the perfect little boy. He slept through the night and was quiet in restaurants. We believed this little boy was going to be a breeze to raise.

At the age of 2 ½, Michael was diagnosed with autism. Autism? We didn't know what that meant. Quickly we found out that the road ahead was going to be a difficult one. We struggled with this new obstacle. We found ourselves trying to work a system that didn't make sense in a world that doesn't make sense half the time. We had a decision to make and realized that if it was a struggle for us, it must have been a struggle for others.

The decision was made to start a support group for families in the Butler community and surrounding areas. This group would be different than others that preceded it. We wanted to be a positive force in the community but didn't know exactly how to do this. At first, we figured we could share information over a cup of coffee. Shortly after this first meeting, a good friend had put us in contact with an incredible individual who was doing great things in our neighboring town of Montville.
